Since its creation in 2000, World Camp volunteers have traveled in southeastern Africa, Central America, and the Indian subcontinent conducting educational programs in rural villages on the subjects of HIV/AIDS, the environment, and gender equality.

### **THE WORLD CAMP EXPERIENCE**



#### FOR STUDENTS...

While the direct student experience is focused on education regarding HIV/AIDS, life

skills, environmental conservation, and gender equality, the concurrent experience allows for cultural interaction and exchange. Volunteers initiate each program with a circle of songs and introductions. Interactive games are played to encourage team building and trust as well as allow a level of comfort to be established between pupils and volunteer instructors. As hunger can lead to distraction, each student at our full day camps receives a meal of local food.

While most students are currently in primary school, World Camp also woks with children and young adults who lives in orphan centers or on the streets.



#### For The Community...

World Camp strives to establish community out-

reach in its programs through community presentation s and empowering students to teach their friends and families about HIV/AIDS and other locally challenging issues. Marking the conclusion of World Camp's educational program at a school, each class performs an original presentation on a topic of HIV prevention or environmental stewardship. Students are proud to display their creative works to their village, and the process initiates the sharing of this vital information to all age groups. The community, empowered by this knowledge, has the tools to work towards further change from the inside out.



#### For Teachers...

While students are engaged in the World Camp 3-day educational program, their teacher s participate in meetings that focus on teaching methods, facts about

HIV/AIDS and the environment, and resource brainstorming. The teachers are also introduced to team building activities to encourage a supportive and open work environment.

At the conclusion of the 3-day teacher seminar, each teacher receives a certificate supported by the Ministry of Education in Malawi. In addition, teachers confirm their commitment to continue World Camp's mission of education. They are encouraged to educate and inform not only students but also the surrounding rural villages and communities.



#### FOR VOLUNTEERS...

World Camp volunteers are the heart and soul of the program. With enthusiasm and passion, they strive to make lifesaving information come alive inside and outside of the classroom. Alongside teaching the World Camp curriculum, volunteers have ample opportunity to experience new cultures and impact communities in need. Volunteers may find themselves teaching others and consequently gaining greater insight into the world and themselves. Volunteer instructors often return to their home countries as ambassadors to the country where they volunteered and advocates of its locally challenging issues.



### **THE MALAWI PROGRAM**

Each year we work in Malawi, our understanding of this country grows along with our commitment to its people. In 2007, three volunteer sessions were held during the months of January to February and May to August. Volunteers spent 5 to 10 weeks teaching the interactive World Camp curriculum in rural communities surrounding Lilongwe. 57 volunteers taught almost 4000 standard 5, 6, 7, and 8 students in 20 primary schools.

World Camp's educational programs in Malawi are really beginning to reach their stride, with a strong community reception and positive retention in testing. We have been testing our students before and after camps for four years now and are happy to say that many classes average **90 percent** on their exit tests.

Volunteers on their second or third trip to Malawi contributed a great deal to our program in 2007 as volunteer coordinators. Paul North and Ben Crosswell augmented our conservation curriculum with a **tree planting project**. Paul also contributed a **malaria education** component. Molly Brey and Price Massey expanded our **work with teachers**, adding initiatives and discussions aimed at empowering them to be community leaders. Seeing volunteers return to contribute more to our program is satisfying and reaffirming.

We hope to soon place a returning volunteer in Malawi for a yearlong service term to maintain prevention clubs at schools and facilitate HIV testing and counseling.

### THE HONDURAS PROGRAM

In our second summer working in Honduras, **20 volunteers** continued to assess the local understanding of HIV and build a responsive curriculum in **two five-week sessions** in May to August.

For 2007, volunteer instructors worked with over **1,100 students** in the local communities surrounding the coastal city of **Tela**. The educational projects focused on refining young Hondurans' views of HIV, and encouraging them to be brave in fighting this disease. Volunteers found their conversations with students about the behaviors that lead to HIV transmission especially fulfilling.

In addition to these educational projects, volunteers held programs in local **orphanages**, completed **school building improvement projects**, **maintained trails** in local national parks, and conducted **open question and answer sessions** for patients awaiting treatment in nearby **medical clinics**.

Building on what volunteers learned about HIV in Honduras in 2007, new programming will try to reach out more to rural communities receiving little education. Coastal Garifuna communities, already a focus for the Honduras program, will remain a strong part of our program in 2008.

"World Camp is particularly valuable because of the **comprehensive** approach it takes to teaching HIV/ AIDS prevention. ### THE INDIA PROGRAM

Inspiring change is what World Camp is all about, and India is a telling story. By the end of her five weeks in Malawi, **Sonal Raja** was ready to take our programming to a new population. Friends pointed her to **Manav Sadhna**, an NGO working from Gandhi's Ashram in Ahmedabad, the capital of Gujarat. Manav Sadhna provides enriching programs for the underserved populations of the city, making it a perfect fit for a collaboration with World Camp. On July 2nd, with **10 volunteers**, World Camp began its first classes in Gujarati.

We soon found India to be an ideal place for us to work: a very high HIV case load, a changing sexual climate, and little knowledge about the disease. It is estimated that less than half of Indian women know what AIDS is. Due to public ignorance, discrimination against HIV-positive people is a common problem. In addition, HIV exacerbates epidemics of tuberculosis, which are already rampant in the slums. Whether young or old, students warmly received the information we brought. Our work included a visit to a school for the blind and one for the deaf. We taught classes in city parks and others on the grounds of Gandhi's Ashram. By teaching clinics for NGO staff and a Teachers School, we informed some very interested adults that will go on to share their knowledge with others. We were also able to share information as staff at Seva Café, a conceptual restaurant interested in inspiring service in others. In all, our pilot program in India served almost 1000 students, teachers, and community leaders.

Our initial program made us aware of just how much there is to do, and what a wonderful place India is to work. Our India project is a wonderful opportunity to learn and to serve, and we look forward to expanding to two full volunteer sessions in 2008.

### THE JORDAN NEAL HENSON SCHOLARSHIP FUND

In rural Malawi, poverty prevents many young adults from seeking higher education. Though primary school is free to the public, secondary school requires a fee. The scholarships provide financial support to vulnerable students who are faced with the challenges of being orphaned by one or both of their parents. The fund seeks out students who show promise for success but cannot afford the fees and living expenses associated with secondary school in Malawi. The recipients of this fund are selected by an application process and recommendations from teachers and headmasters. The fund provides school fees, book and supply allowances as well as clothing and food allowances. Recipients are monitored by World Camp program coordinators, World Camp volunteers, local area management and an assigned Malawian mentor and role model.

Hannah Mwandida Jickson, 17 years old, hails from the Msundwe village in rural Lilongwe, Malawi. When she was younger she became an orphan along with her four siblings when her father passed away from shingles and her mother lost her life to malaria. Her family was broken apart and Hannah was placed under the care of her aunt, a rural farmer with several children of her own.


